Western Renewed Update

The start of a new year seems like a good time to update everyone on the progress of the Western Renewed project, with special attention to the utility relocations.

Of course your first reaction may well be the same as mine - this thing is dragging into another year?! The pace has been frustrating for everyone, but we've faced numerous obstacles:

- City electrical inspectors were badly understaffed through all of 2012, making scheduling incredibly difficult.
- Our electrical contractor faced serious health issues in 2012, keeping him out of action at various times. Changing contractors in the middle of such a complex project was not a viable option, so we've been patient out of necessity and out of loyalty to someone who has been a great working partner.
- Electrical lines have more rules and regulations than any other endeavor in life and rightly so because electricity can kill or start fires but devising cost-effective solutions in a dense urban environment is incredibly difficult. Especially if your inspector and contractor are unavailable!
- The City came along and took our lights! LED lighting is fine, but City lopped off the tops of our historic lights that we had just installed! That was an enormous distraction in 2012 but a battle we HAD to fight.

On the other hand, we had some serious victories in 2012:

- The City restored our historic lights after much time and energy.
- TEN properties saw their wires REMOVED and 4 more are ready to go once the inspector comes out to approve them. We reached consensus agreement on a design solution for MacIntosh Row that will eliminate the lines and poles on Western without adding overhead lines to the rear of the properties, AND without spending \$250,000 on trenching! This was a huge step forward.
- We have a design solution to servicing 2 of the 5 "courtyard properties" in the 800 block, and we are nearing final design for the remaining 3 properties, again without having to spend prohibitive sums on trenching.
- We raised an additional \$20,000 in funds from the Rivers Casino Fund at Northside Leadership Conference to cover the added costs of the utility relocations. As a result, the property owners who had to relocate service have not had to spend ONE ADDITIONAL DOLLAR to make those changes - we've borne all the costs!
- AWCC designed planting beds for the entryway intersection at Allegheny and Western, and raised an additional \$100,000 in funds from the Rivers Casino Fund at Northside Leadership Conference to cover those costs, plus pay for plantings and edging in the tree pits, as well as hanging baskets for the poles. This will enable us to realize the full vision for this street that the neighborhood and the Western Ave owners had from the beginning!
- The City hired one new inspector and our electrician has come through his illness and is ready to roll on next steps. The vast majority of property owners has paid their NID assessments, or is on a payment plan. For the few who failed to pay, we have placed a lien on the property, so we will eventually be paid. Everyone will pay their fair share as planned and approved by the City.

So there was significant progress, though most of it behind the scenes.

As for the utility relocations, we had 31 properties that had to have lines relocated from their front facades on Western. Those fall into 3 categories: MacIntosh Row (8), Courtyard Properties (5) and Standalone Properties (18). Look for an update on this part of the project in the March Gazette. As for the poles and service lines on Western, Duquesne Light will not remove its poles until ALL utility relocations are complete. So we need to solve 31 out of 31, or we can't take out the poles. The remaining tall streetlights are paid for and are sitting in storage, but can't be installed until the poles and wires are removed. So EVERYTHING depends on completing these utility relocations for all 31 properties.

Marcus Houser of NSLC continues to work as the Project Manager for Western Renewed. He is, or will be, in contact with individual property owners who still need work done. If you have any questions about your specific property, don't hesitate to call Marcus at 412-330-2557.

We appreciate everyone's patience and understanding through this long process. We also understand Impatience and any lack of understanding, because we've felt the same way at times.
