Those hard-earned dollars will be put to good use, too. For those of you who haven't been to a general meeting lately (show of hands?) we have quite a few irons in the fire:

- The Stables building and the Value Added Foods building on W. North Avenue We're trying to get both these properties developed in a manner that will enhance our residential neighborhood. These properties require stabilization, maintenance, design work, and the right development partners.
- Western Avenue improvement We're on the last leg of this project, but getting some of the electrical lines moved
 is proving to be a real challenge. If you run into Gloria Rayman, please thank her for all her hard work moving this
 forward.
- McIntosh Row We've sold two of these buildings, but have four more on the market. Meanwhile, management, maintenance, and repair costs continue.
- Parking We've been working hard to reduce the impact of overflow parking from events at Heinz Field and Stage AE. That has required us to go to the Zoning Board of Adjustment lately to challenge lot owners seeking variances to increase parking in our neighborhood.
- Property Reassessments Yes, like you, the Civic Council had its properties reassessed last year. Some of the proposed values are laughably high, especially on vacant lots, but we have to appeal them to keep our taxes reasonable.
- Nuisance properties We have a few on Western Avenue, and we're working to have them sold or properly cared for.

And those are just some of the things we're doing. So, as you can see, the revenue from our house tours, while stretched thin, is put to very good use.

It's not all hard work around Allegheny West, though. Tim Zinn, our new Membership chair, is continuing our bowling tradition at the Elks Lodge on Cedar Avenue. If you haven't been bowling with your neighbors, please stop by and give it a try. None of us are very good, so there is no need for embarrassment over your athletic skills. I'm sure Tim will have lots of other news on Allegheny West events, including our mixers, block parties, and special events.

With that, I'm going to sign off on my first Gazette missive. I look forward to seeing you all soon, and wish you a very prosperous New Year.

Learn More about the Allegheny Commons at the January Membership Meeting

Allegheny Commons, Pittsburgh's oldest park, is a beautiful asset not only to our neighborhood but the entire North Side.

As Pittsburgh's oldest park, Allegheny Commons dates to 1867 when it was designed to provide "breathing places" for the citizens of what was then the sooty city of Allegheny. The creation of the park reflected the 19th century movement to beautify American cities and improve urban living conditions. Today, the park's 80 acres provide many recreational and cultural amenities including over 1,000 trees of 100 different species.

The Master Plan for Allegheny Commons aims to protect the historic integrity of this important open space, while recognizing and protecting the evolution over time of its design and uses. The park restoration committee is led by the Allegheny Commons Initiative (ACI) Steering Committee, a project of the North Side Leadership Conference. It is comprised of representatives from surrounding neighborhoods and institutions.

At the January 8 membership meeting Alida Baker, Project Director of the ACI, will report on several projects including the potential nomination of the park to the National Register of Historic Places; the QR codes tree project; Friends of Allegheny Commons membership campaign; the upcoming Annual Meeting; and the status of the bridges in the park. Come and find out how you can help with this important project.


