As we continue to highlight one of the AWCC's standing committees each month to encourage greater participation in the organization, this month we feature the Ways &d Means Committee. According to AWCC's Bylaws, the Ways & Means Committee shall be responsible for all fundraising activities of the Civic Council.

This short description however belies the magnitude of the work involved in planning and executing the events that are necessary to generate the funds we need to keep the Civic Council operating. One of the largest responsibilities is organizing the Christmas House Tour, which is our largest fundraiser of the year.

Gloria has been doing an excellent job of organizing our long-standing fundraisers, such as the Christmas House Tour, as well as planning new and exciting events, like the Wine Tasting Tour. 
