Stone Fence

- 2.00 oz. bourbon (see Notes)
- 2 or 3 small lumps of ice
- Sweet cider to taste (see Notes)

Add the bourbon and ice to a large bar glass, then fill with cider.

NOTES:

- As always, drink responsibly.
- Supposedly, this was a Revolutionary War favorite, drunk by Ethan Allen and his Green Mountain Boys prior to their successful assault on Fort Ticonderoga. Well, maybe.
- Bourbon There's a lot of cider in this, so save your good bourbon (or rye) for sipping and use some cheaper stuff instead. If you want to be truly authentic, use cheap, strongly flavored rum. That's how they made it back in the 1770s.
- Cider The Revolutionaries would have used hard cider. By Civil War times, recipes called for the kind of sweet cider you can buy at the market.
- You may need to alter the ingredient proportions, depending on which kind of cider you use, the size of your glass, and how sweet you like your cocktails. Start with a little cider and add more until you find your sweet (or dry) spot.
