City of Pittsburgh Celebrates Arbor Day with New Arboretum Designation at Allegheny Commons Park

As the City of Pittsburgh marks its 20th consecutive year as a Tree City USA, the Department of Public Works is proud to announce that Allegheny Commons Park has been formally accredited as a Level I Arboretum by ArbNet, a global network that supports the work of arboreta through professional standards and accreditation.

This prestigious designation recognizes Allegheny Commons Park for its growing collection of tree species, community engagement, and commitment to education, stewardship, and long-term planning. ...

"This milestone is about more than just trees—it's about the health of our neighborhoods, the beauty of our parks, and the strength of our commitment to sustainability," said Mayor Ed Gainey. "Being a Tree City USA for 20 years shows how deeply Pittsburgh values its green spaces, and the ArbNet recognition at Allegheny Commons proves that we are continuing to lead with purpose, partnership, and pride." ...

To achieve Level I accreditation through ArbNet, Allegheny Commons Park met the following criteria:

- A collection of at least 25 species of trees or woody plants
- A documented arboretum plan and established planting and maintenance standards
- A dedicated group of staff or volunteers to manage the collection
- Ongoing community education and engagement efforts.

Cocktail Corner

Opera Cocktail

- Stir with ice:
 - o 2.0 oz dry gin
 - o 0.5 oz Dubonnet (see Notes)
 - o 0.5 oz maraschino liqueur
 - 1 dash orange bitters
- Strain into a cocktail glass

Notes

- As always, drink responsibly.
- Those who read last month's Cocktail Corner rushed out to buy a bottle of Dubonnet, if they didn't have one already. Dubonnet, like vermouth, is a fortified wine with added spices. What makes it different is that it contains some quinine (like tonic water). Like vermouth, Dubonnet comes in both sweet (red) and dry (yellowish) versions. You'll want to use the sweet Dubonnet Rouge in this drink.
- For gin, use a dry London gin, not a sweeter Plymouth or Old Tom gin.
- There were several versions of this drink published in bar guides over the years, mostly varying by the proportions. An early recipe calls for a 1:1 proportion of gin to Dubonnet. Another specifies 2:1. I think this is too sweet, which is why I use the 4:1 ratio above. Personal tastes vary, though, and you may find that the half ounce of Dubonnet, plus the maraschino liqueur, do not provide the level of sweetness you like. Change things up on your next iteration. Personally, I would use 2 dashes of the orange bitters. I'm that kind of guy.
- The Opera is an excellent drink to serve at your next cocktail party. I served it at my last party to my friends Falstaff, Carmen, Figaro, Madame Butterfly, and Boris Gudonov. They all loved it. Oh, and serve the drink in a cocktail glass, not a magic flute.




Illustration of Quatrain 51 by EJ Sullivan, 1913

Happy Preservation Month!

In May, we celebrate historic preservation because of its ability to improve the quality of the lives of people through saving buildings and places that are not only an important part of our cultural heritage, but can be the basis of helping renew communities for the future.

But even as we celebrate this National Preservation Month, our organization is concerned about the ongoing dismantling of federal historic preservation programs, and other support services that are vital to our socio-cultural life.

We have seen this in the decimation of funding for community development incentives, institutions of higher learning, libraries, museums, national parks, and public broadcasting. The loss of funding for these programs collectively affects all of us, including the preservation community.

Here in Pittsburgh, we have seen partner organizations including the Phipps Conservatory and Botanical Gardens, the Carnegie Library of Homestead, and the Society to Preserve the Millvale Murals of Maxo Vanka at St. Nicholas Church in Millvale— to name but a few— targeted for loss of critical funding that was dedicated to substantive historic preservation work.

Over the years, our organization has been intimately involved not only with these three organizations but many others caught up in this hollowing out of the capacity of non-profit organizations dedicated to improving the lives of people.

Our organization opposes these measures and we will continue to seek partnerships with other organizations, donors, members and friends, who, like us, believe that renewing communities and building pride is an important part of saving our city and region's distinctive built environment— both because of its history and adaptation for use in the future.
