Blue Moon Cocktail

Harry Ensselin, Recipes for Mixed Drinks (1916)

- ❖ 1.5 oz Gin
- ❖ 0.5 oz French Vermouth
- ❖ 1 dash Orange Bitters
- 1 dash Crème Yvette (see Notes)


Stir with ice and strain into a cocktail glass Float some Claret on top

Notes

- ➤ As always, drink responsibly.
- > For French Vermouth, read dry. If you want the best color, use the clearest vermouth you can get. Dolin's is good. A vermouth that is too yellow will turn the drink a muddier color.
- ➤ Up until the Crème Yvette, this looks a lot like a Martini. Crème Yvette is a berry flavored purple liqueur, readily available at the PLCB. You may need a tad more than a dash to get the color you want. If you don't have any, you can substitute Crème de Violette (used in the Aviation Cocktail). Be careful, though: too much Crème de Violette can result in a soapy taste.
- ➤ The Claret is optional. No garnish is called for, but do as you please.

A brief glimpse into the old world charm of Buttercup Way, Allegheny West

Nestled quietly in Allegheny West lies Buttercup Way, a name that conjures images of meadows in bloom, childhood daydreams, and a gentler pace of life. Buttercup Way runs along the back of old Victorian homes and warehouses located along the more stately West North and Beech Avenues in Allegheny West.

According to Pittsburgh Streets, the lane was laid out as Buttercup Alley in 1879 in a plan of lots that subdivided the estate of Elizabeth F. Denny. (1,2) It became Buttercup Way in 1914, when a City of Pittsburgh ordinance changed all "alleys" to "ways". (3) In a 1929 column in the Pittsburgh Press, Frank C. Harper used Buttercup Way as an example of a name that recalled an earlier time in Pittsburgh's history: "For there is no buttercup now on Buttercup way and Verdant way long ago ceased to be verdant." (4)

Buttercup Way's history indicates that it served purposes beyond being a thoroughfare; it also contained places of business. William P Price and his son George ran an electrical contracting business from a building constructed in 1895. (5)

Recently, as part of its planned street surfacing work, the City excavated the yellow bricks of the 900 block of Buttercup Way and repaved the entire alley to Rope Way with asphalt. The bricks of the 800 block of Buttercup Way remain in situ under the asphalt. In between the old asphalt being removed and the new paving poured, residents of Allegheny West were treated to Buttercup Way's true self, a wonderfully laid herringbone pattern of yellow bricks. The adjacent photo of Buttercup Way's herringbone pattern was taken at night from the corner of Galveston and Buttercup shortly after the old asphalt was removed. The picture shows the wonderful detail of the pattern and color of the bricks.

The herringbone pattern was chosen for many of the older laneways and alleyways of Pittsburgh for several reasons. The pattern itself, formed by arranging rectangular bricks in a zigzag or V-shape, creates an interlocking structure that is exceptionally strong and can withstand heavy loads and resist shifting. This was especially valuable for lanes and alleys which often (and still do) experience significant traffic. These days however, it is more garbage



trucks and cars versus horse drawn carriages. Beyond its functional benefits, the herringbone pattern also offered a visually engaging and structured appearance, adding to the architecture of the area.

Sadly, when the City assessed the condition of the bricks of Buttercup Way it was deemed cost prohibitive to be considered for repaving. The City did assure us that some of the yellow bricks that were dug up have been stored in the event there is an opportunity to consider restoration of Buttercup Way in the future. I surely hope there is a way.
