Cocktail Corner

So So Cocktail

- ❖ 0.25 oz grenadine
- ♦ 0.25 oz calvados
- ♦ 0.50 oz Cinzano rosso [or any good red vermouth]
- ♦ 0.50 oz dry gin

Stir with ice and strain into a cocktail glass.

Notes

- > As always, drink responsibly.
- > Supposedly invented by Mr. P. Soso of London's Kit-Kat Club. I've never been. Was he inspired by a cocktail muse or just hanging out at the bar mixing up whatever was at hand? We will never know, and that's fine.
- > Grenadine is readily available. You can go for the standard bottle sold at the PLCB or get some very good stuff online. Nominally, grenadine is pomegranate syrup, but it's almost always been just some red sugary syrup, often with not a hint of a pomegranate. I've used real pomegranate syrup and regular old grenadine, and it's often hard to tell much difference. You can make your own with a pomegranate, sugar, water, and a strainer, but why bother?
- > For Cinzano rosso, read sweet, red vermouth. Again, you needn't break the bank looking for the best available, although a better vermouth usually makes a better cocktail. There's enough going on in this recipe, though, that a great vermouth like Antica Formula might be wasted.
- If you've read this column before, and I'm sure you have, you've heard me extol the virtues of calvados. It's an apple brandy from Normandy, and it's divine. If you haven't a bottle, get one. With autumn coming up, apple brandy-based cocktails and toddies are a sure hit.
- ➤ Use any decent dry gin. No Old Tom or Plymouth gin in this one, unless you like your drink very sweet. This cocktail is probably going to taste a bit sweet to your palate anyway. You should feel free to experiment with proportions, here. Make it as directed the first time and then doctor it up to suit your taste. The second one will be perfect. Probably.
- There are no bitters in this drink, so some would argue it's not a cocktail. I'd rather drink one than argue, though.

At the **Northside Chronicle's 40th Anniversary Party** in August, AWCC neighbor **Mark Fatla** received one of four awards given to city residents who have contributed to the Northside community. Here is the text of the speech given by Sean Ray, Managing Editor of the Chronicle, as he recognized Mark:

There are few people who have appeared in The Northside Chronicle more often than our next awardee, Mark Fatla. And that's not just because he's a bit of a publicity hound. If you search "Mark Fatla" on our website, you'll get ten full pages of results. And that's just since 2009 — if we had all the old print editions online, we'd probably need to give him his own archive.

But when you lead the Northside Leadership Conference for 15 years and volunteer at Allegheny West Civic Council and help raise money for scholarships and do everything else Mark has been involved with, you tend to make news — a lot of it good. Whether he was fighting for funding, championing neighborhood development, or emceeing a scholarship luncheon or some other major Northside event, Mark always seemed to be in the right place and in front of a camera. Some people just have a knack.

During Mark's tenure, he boosted the Northside in an unimaginable number of ways, from securing a \$3 million community benefits agreement with Rivers Casino to organizing Northside Sandwich Week to raising tens of thousands of dollars in scholarships to partnerships with Allegheny General Hospital to helping revitalize East Ohio Street. He was also there for the smaller things that didn't make the newspaper, like helping neighbors deal with problem landlords or finding time to help neighbors in need with free legal help.

While no longer at the Conference, Mark continues to appear in The Chronicle even now. In fact, he adds another appearance in this very issue with the recent release of his new book "Pittsburgh's Historic Stadiums and Arenas."

- **Train Museum** | The definitive model train collection in the world. Volunteers needed to staff the third and fourth floor of Holmes Hall during the tour. Training and notes provided.
- Tour Announcer | Announce the upcoming tours to corral the tour goers at Calvary.
